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Skanska Adds Finishing Touches to Bring USS Intrepid to Life

NEW YORK (Oct. 28, 2008) – Skanska USA Building Inc. announced today that construction teams raised and installed gangways as part of the final phase of construction to prepare the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space museum to open next month. The gangways will transport an estimated one million visitors onto the ship each year and – in addition to utility connections from landside – permanently secure the USS Intrepid in her newly reconstructed berth at Pier 86 in Hudson River Park.

Skanska's New York office, one of the world's leading construction management companies, has reconstructed Pier 86 (on the west side of Manhattan, at 12th Avenue and 46th Street) from the riverbed up into a state-of-the-art "military-style" pier facility. Skanska worked under contract to the Hudson River Park Trust through funding secured by the Intrepid Museum.

The decommissioned carrier has no onboard water or power supplies. Last week, Skanska plugged the ship into its utility "umbilicals" on the pier to connect the Intrepid to its landside visitor's center with utility sources to bring the ship

back to life. A series of flexible hoses ranging from 4 inches to 6 inches in diameter transport water and waste while the "chiller" plant at the end of the pier supplies the ship with heat and air conditioning.

The five gangways are each 46-feet-long, providing access from the 64-foot-high glass elevator tower and three stair towers with the ship's hangar deck, flight decks and lower deck. Each gangway contains galvanized aluminum panels and canopies that match the towers' architecture.

Construction features: According to Project Manager Stephan Freid, Skanska first removed the original deteriorated pier and then built its replacement on 360 steel-pipe piles driven to bedrock. The pier structure is a "sandwich" of drainage mat, high-density traffic-bearing foam fill, gravel, soil and finished concrete paving. Skanska brought in a special team of divers and underwater engineers to complete the environmentally-sensitive project.

The pier's deck surface pattern resembles the waving stripes of a flag. The pier itself is 782' long by 150' wide and extends into the Hudson River from a 217' peninsula bulkhead. In addition, the pier is an access way for delivery and emergency vehicles. The Concorde aircraft, originally on a barge has also been permanently installed on the western end of the pier.
